It is a joy to see the Adventist school and community thriving independently. The entire community continues to benefit from the education and livelihood interventions we initiated.

In Bangladesh and Nepal, our Adventist schools and after-school sports programs and computer training continue to be safe spaces for children to learn. Through your support, we have been able to train and equip more teachers with child-friendly

teaching methods.

The Women's Health Project in Nepal continues to expand and phase two of our Water Project in Bangladesh has led to improved health outcomes for women and children through our programs.

When you give to Asian Aid you are making a difference, your contributions pave the way for academic and holistic success for children who otherwise are at risk of harm and do not have the resources to reach their God-given potential. For the children we support, the basic life essentials - food, water, school, healthcare - are not a given. They should be!

A GIFT OR A GIVEN?

ost of the people in her community are from the marginalised sections of society and are forced to go to India to earn a living. It is no surprise then that many young children drop out of school. However, the reasons for these dropouts will surprise you.

One of the reasons for the high dropout rates is that children are unable to buy the stationery required to attend school. Parents have very low incomes and do not prioritise school essentials, resulting in more irregularity of children at school. As they grow older, many of them leave their education behind to work, while many girls end up marrying early.

Jamuna faced the same issues, and along with other children in her family, she discontinued her studies. Their income was just not enough for food and other essentials.

In an effort to decrease school dropouts due to migration to India and child marriage, our project selected 100 underprivileged children from various schools, and Jamuna was one of them. In November 2022, Jamuna participated in our first project meeting, where she showed interest in continuing to come to school. Through the project, she received five chickens and takes good care of them. She reared them and sold them for a good price, which helped her and her family to manage some expenses for her school.







- 102 children had their birth registration completed last quarter. Birth registration is an important process that provides legal identity to children and establishes their rights provided by the state
- Reduced number of children (5% of total students of class 8, 9 and 10) dropped out of school
- Reduced number of children (23) went to India for wage labour
- 83% of girls in our project schools attended school during their monthly period
- 108 out of 228 (47%) girls graduated with at least 'C' grade in their school leaving exams
- 80% of girls in our project schools are able to study at home for at least two hours a day
- 3 schools have girl-friendly toilet facilities with water and sanitary pad disposal facilities
- 8 complaints were lodged against child marriage
- 124 adolescent girls have access to adolescent-friendly health services
- 117 women attended 8 ante-natal care visits
- 77 women gave birth in birthing centres
- 20 women received silicon ring pessary service
- 15 women and girls abandoned menstrual huts (chhaupadi) and stayed safely at home during their menstruation period.



We are pleased to be able to phase out our CFSD project linked to an SDA school in a community in South India this year.

We thank our donors who have supported this project where we were able to contribute to ensuring children in that and neighboring communities accessed quality education and economic opportunities while contributing towards the development of their community.

The project (2017-2023) focused on education, gender equality and community development in line with the larger Sustainable Development Goals outlined by the United Nations.

After initial assessments, we were able to create opportunities for individuals to generate sustainable sources of income, to in turn enhance economic stability, reduce poverty, and promote selfreliance. Income generating activities helped parents afford quality education for their children, which resulted in reduced dropout rates, especially of girls. The project activities were designed in response to the needs of the community with community members actively involved in the implementation process. This Child Focused School Development project serves as a shining example of how targeted interventions and dedicated efforts can bring about lasting positive change in the lives of children and their communities.

School and Teacher Development

We were able to create a conducive and effective learning environment for students by renovating and maintaining school buildings, classrooms, libraries, laboratories, playgrounds, and other facilities necessary to inspire the students. Their academic performance improved as you helped provide them with the necessary tools and resources to succeed. We were also able to equip teachers with additional resources to effectively engage students, promote critical thinking and create a dynamic learning environment.

140 children in the school, which is the only English medium school in the whole area, were directly benefitted. This translates to over 120 families as well as over 100 children from neighbouring villages. There has been an increase in overall school enrolment with an improved gender ratio.







Child-Focused Development

Through regular health and hygiene awareness programs for children, we were able to educate and empower many children with the knowledge and skills necessary to maintain good health and hygiene practices such as proper handwashing techniques, dental care, nutrition and exercise.

The creation of regular child clubs and community groups became a key platform where children learnt about their rights and were able to engage in social settings, develop important life skills and foster their overall growth and development.

Our community learning centres offered a safe and inclusive space where children from the community could access educational opportunities and feel supported in their academic development. The centres fostered a love of. lifelong learning by bridging educational gaps and providing equal opportunities for children who are from disadvantaged backgrounds or marginalised communities.



Key learning outcomes focused on the following identified priority areas in MEL:

- Development of MEL plans, as component of project proposal.
- Design and use of SMART indicators for project purpose, output, and activity levels.
- Methods for data collection to match indicators.
- Tools designed to encourage community participation in MEL.
